First and foremost, I would like to thank the men and women of the department who put their lives on the line every day to protect our community. Their dedication and commitment to public service is second to none, and I feel honored and privileged to serve with them.

In 2024, Palm Beach Gardens Fire Rescue successfully mitigated 14,067 emergency calls for service. Our commitment to continual improvement continued in 2024 as we placed our Technical Rescue Team into service.

This team of specially trained firefighters will respond to emergencies involving high angle rescue, building collapse, and victims entrapped in vehicles or machinery. Additionally, we introduced our whole blood program, a lifesaving initiative that allows our paramedics to administer whole blood to patients in critical need before arriving at the hospital. This program places us among only two agencies in the county that offer such a service, underscoring our commitment to advanced, life-saving care.

We have also expanded our community partnerships, by partnering with Nicklaus Children's Hospital, the South Florida affiliate of Project ADAM (Automated Defibrillators in Adam's Memory). Project ADAM is an organization dedicated to offering free life-saving training. The program teaches school staff how to perform CPR, use an automated external defibrillator (AED), and develop a site-specific emergency response plan. Participating schools receive a two-year Project ADAM recognition and commit to performing a minimum of 1 drill annually. The Benjamin High School became the first school in Palm Beach Gardens to be designated as a Project ADAM Heart Safe School.

As we look forward to 2025, we remain dedicated to providing world-class fire and EMS services to our community. Our commitment to continual improvement will remain a guiding principle in everything we do, so that we can continue to provide the best level of service possible.

GARDENS GREEN:

NOT JUST A COLOR, BUT A CULTURE

In 1979, our City made a bold and innovative decision to change the color of our fire trucks from red to green. This change was based on a study conducted by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) that showed green fire trucks had better visibility, ultimately increasing safety for our firefighters and the community. In 2012, Pierce Manufacturing officially named the unique shade of green for our trucks as “Gardens Green”, and since then, our department has been known for our iconic green trucks. This shift wasn’t just about color; it marked the beginning of a cultural transformation that continues to define us as we remain committed to providing exceptional service.

As a dually accredited department with an ISO 1 classification,

we are among an elite group of fire departments in the United States. Only 16 out of over 37,500 fire departments in the United States share this distinction, underscoring our commitment to excellence and public service. This rare accomplishment reflects our dedication to continuous improvement, ensuring that we provide world-class fire and rescue services based on best practices, innovative technology, the latest science, and exceptional customer service.

More than just accolades, it’s our culture that sets us apart. From firefighters to the fire chief, we believe that it is an honor and privilege to care for people in their time of need. At the heart of our work is a deep sense of responsibility. We

don’t just respond to emergencies; we are proactive, continuously training, maintaining physical conditioning, and building strong relationships with our community through public education.

Our reputation for excellence is built on years of hard work, dedication, and a shared commitment to making our city safer for everyone.

[LIFESAVING AWARDS]

Department personnel were recognized at five Lifesaving Award ceremonies as part of the HEARTSafe program, which honors Fire Rescue teams who successfully resuscitate cardiac arrest patients while preserving neurological function upon discharge. These ceremonies unite survivors, their families, dispatchers, and hospital staff to celebrate the teamwork and unwavering dedication that make life-saving moments possible.



ACCOMPLISHMENTS



Earned the American Heart Association's **Mission: Lifeline Gold** award again in 2024! This marks the **tenth year in a row** that the department has been recognized for its efforts in caring for and treating patients who have had a heart attack. Less than 500 departments nationwide hold a Class 1 rating.



Driver/Engineer Hewitt received the **Palm Beach North Chamber of Commerce's Community Service Award** during its Annual Valor and Community Service Awards breakfast for his work with the department's Fire Explorers program


Our **whole blood transfusion program** officially launched on April 18, 2024. Since its inception, we have successfully administered 12 units of whole blood—9 to trauma patients and 3 to medical patients.

Our department is proud to be 1 of only 2 in the county, and 1 of just 8 municipalities across the state, currently implementing this lifesaving program.

In addition, we are utilizing TXA (tranexamic acid), a medication that supports the body's ability to maintain clots that have already formed, further enhancing our trauma care capabilities.

TRANSFER OF WATER

This ceremony symbolizes continuity of service and tradition as water is passed from a retiring fire engine to a new one, honoring the legacy of the apparatus and those who served on it.



The department celebrated the arrival of Engine 63 and Engine 65 with a **Push-Back Ceremony**, honoring the traditions of our fire service. Department members, City staff, and community supporters came together to officially place the new engines into service. The event served as a tribute to our history while highlighting the department's commitment to excellence, blending time-honored customs with modern advancements in firefighting.

OUR COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS



Cressey Sports Performance has partnered with the department since 2019, working with the recruit academy to ensure top physical conditioning. Their strength and conditioning program focuses on firefighter functional fitness to meet job demands and prevent injuries.

Since its inception, Palm Beach Gardens Fire Rescue has been actively involved in **Palm Beach Gardens High School Pre-Medicine Program**. Personnel provide lectures on medical emergencies, emergency medical skills, and basic ECG interpretation, while also offering hands-on experience through ride-alongs with fire rescue crews.

Palm Beach Gardens Fire Rescue and **Palm Beach Gardens Medical Center** collaborate in February for American Heart Month and again in May for National Stroke Awareness Month. The focus is to educate the public on recognizing heart attack and stroke symptoms, understanding risk factors, making lifestyle changes to reduce risk, and the critical importance of early 911 access.



Department personnel participated in the Delray Beach **St. Patrick's Day Parade**, which has been held annually since 1968.



Eleven individuals from our department took part in the **2024 First Responders Games** from September 10th to 13th, where they competed in soccer against 18 other teams.







EMERGENCY CALLS PER STATION ZONE




TOTAL CALL VOLUME BY YEAR*

Patients that meet "alert" criteria are critically ill and require rapid transport to specialty hospitals so that they can receive the best possible care in order to decrease morbidity and mortality. The goal is to provide rapid stabilization and short on-scene times of 10 minutes or less. Hospitals are notified early, so that they can prepare to receive the patient upon Fire Rescue's arrival.





RAPID INTERVENTION TEAM (RIT) TRAINING

To improve firefighter safety and emergency response, personnel completed Rapid Intervention Team (RIT) and Mayday training. RIT teams, consisting of at least two firefighters, are specifically designated to locate and rescue firefighters in distress during Mayday incidents. A Mayday is declared when a firefighter is lost, trapped, injured, or unaccounted for at an emergency scene.

The department's RIT competition team demonstrated their expertise in firefighter rescues by competing at the Florida Fire Conference, showcasing their advanced skills in high-pressure scenarios.



The department hosted a **K9 Handler/Paramedic + Tactical** training course. This event aligns with the passage of Senate Bill 388, signed by Governor DeSantis in June 2021, which enables EMTs and paramedics to provide emergency medical care to police canines injured in the line of duty. The bill also authorizes EMS providers to transport these injured canines to veterinary clinics for life-saving care. Attendees from across the country participated in this important training.

The Fire Department partnered with The Benjamin School to help it achieve the **“HEARTSafe School”** designation through Nicklaus Children’s Hospital and the **Project ADAM** program, making it the first school to receive this certification. This initiative enhances schools’ readiness for cardiac emergencies by establishing an Emergency Action Plan, certifying staff in CPR, and ensuring AEDs are readily accessible.



[EMERGENCY RESPONSE & TRT]

The Technical Rescue Team (TRT) will officially be placed in service on January 1, 2025, strengthening our department's emergency response capabilities. As our City grows, so do the complexities of emergency incidents. Through strategic planning, ongoing training, and cutting-edge equipment, our TRT is prepared to meet the evolving needs of our expanding and diverse community.



TO QUALIFY AS A TRT RESPONDER, PERSONNEL MUST EARN CERTIFICATIONS IN:



Rope Rescue: Trains personnel in high-angle and low-angle rope rescue techniques to safely access and extricate victims from elevated or confined spaces.



Structural Collapse: Prepares responders to assess, stabilize, and conduct rescues in buildings or structures that have partially or fully collapsed



Trench Rescue: Equips our team to safely navigate and perform rescues in collapsed trenches, focusing on stabilizing the area, assessing the risk, and using specialized techniques to extricate victims without causing further harm.



Vehicle & Machinery Rescue: Handles complex rescues involving entrapments in vehicles and heavy equipment. Trained in stabilization, cutting, and lifting, they employ specialized skills to safely remove victims and manage high-risk scenes with precision and strong teamwork.

The Community Risk Reduction Division (CRRD) keeps our community safe by identifying risks and preventing emergencies. Through fire safety education and inspections, our CRRD teams collaborate with residents, businesses, and organizations to reduce hazards and enhance public safety—protecting lives, property, and well-being.



Fire Plans Examiners play a vital role in ensuring public safety by reviewing building plans to confirm compliance with fire codes, preventing hazards before construction begins.

Through ongoing instruction and practical exercises, participants develop critical skills in emergency response, teamwork, and leadership. Explorers also compete in statewide Fire Explorer competitions, where they apply their training, test their abilities, and gain valuable real-world experience in the field.
